Community's Vision - 5 Key Principles

Over the course of engagement through 2023 and 2024, community have described an ambitious vision for what the new Cultural Centre facilities can offer for Dalby.

The vision can be summarised in five key principles:

CULTURAL CULTIVATOR



Making culture and the arts engaging and accessible for everyone.

02

YOUTH AND TEENS



Create more opportunities for our young people to ensure they have engaging, happy, healthy lives in Dalby.

03

A SOCIAL HUB



Create an exciting new centre for social connection and entertainment.

04

EMBEDDED IN NATURE



Create a cultural centre integrated into beautiful natural surrounds.

05

GATEWAY TO WESTERN DOWNS



Solidify Dalby's position as a must-visit gateway to the region.

CULTURAL CULTIVATOR

Community described a vision for an approachable mixing chamber for arts and culture, where storytelling, creativity and performance are not confined to one space but spill out across the site to reach more people.

The goal is to create a site that sparks incidental discovery and spontaneous engagement, making culture an integral part of everyday life.

1a – Shared flexible foyer space

A mixing chamber where art, events and people overlap – encouraging accidental discovery.



1b – Multi-space art gallery with maker space

Exhibition rooms with expansive views over the parkland and double height ceiling create an inspiring environment to experience exhibitions and get creative.



1c – Outdoor performance space

Take a seat in the amphitheatre or bring a picnic blanket for theatre, dance and music in a parkland setting.



1d – Park Pavilion

Covered programmable public space connecting the precinct and creating a gateway to the park. Space for markets, performance, social events and celebrations connecting cinema and VIC to library, gallery and foyer.

YOUTH AND TEENS

Dalby has 2000 teens and tweens who need more opportunities to learn new skills, play, socialise and be entertained in safe and welcoming spaces. Community strongly feels that the new cultural centre facilities should create these opportunities and become a place where youth are encouraged to engage in culture. It could be a magnet for national touring arts, giving local youth exposure to new ideas and experiences. There should also be new spaces to support school arts programming and performance.

Space to kickabout, hang out, study among the trees and socialise, all with the safety of improved lighting and passive surveillance

A pathway network for play and active travel on scooters or bikes.



2b – Library tech rooms

Opportunities for VR, gaming and tech for education and entertainment.



2d – Cinema and multimedia rooms

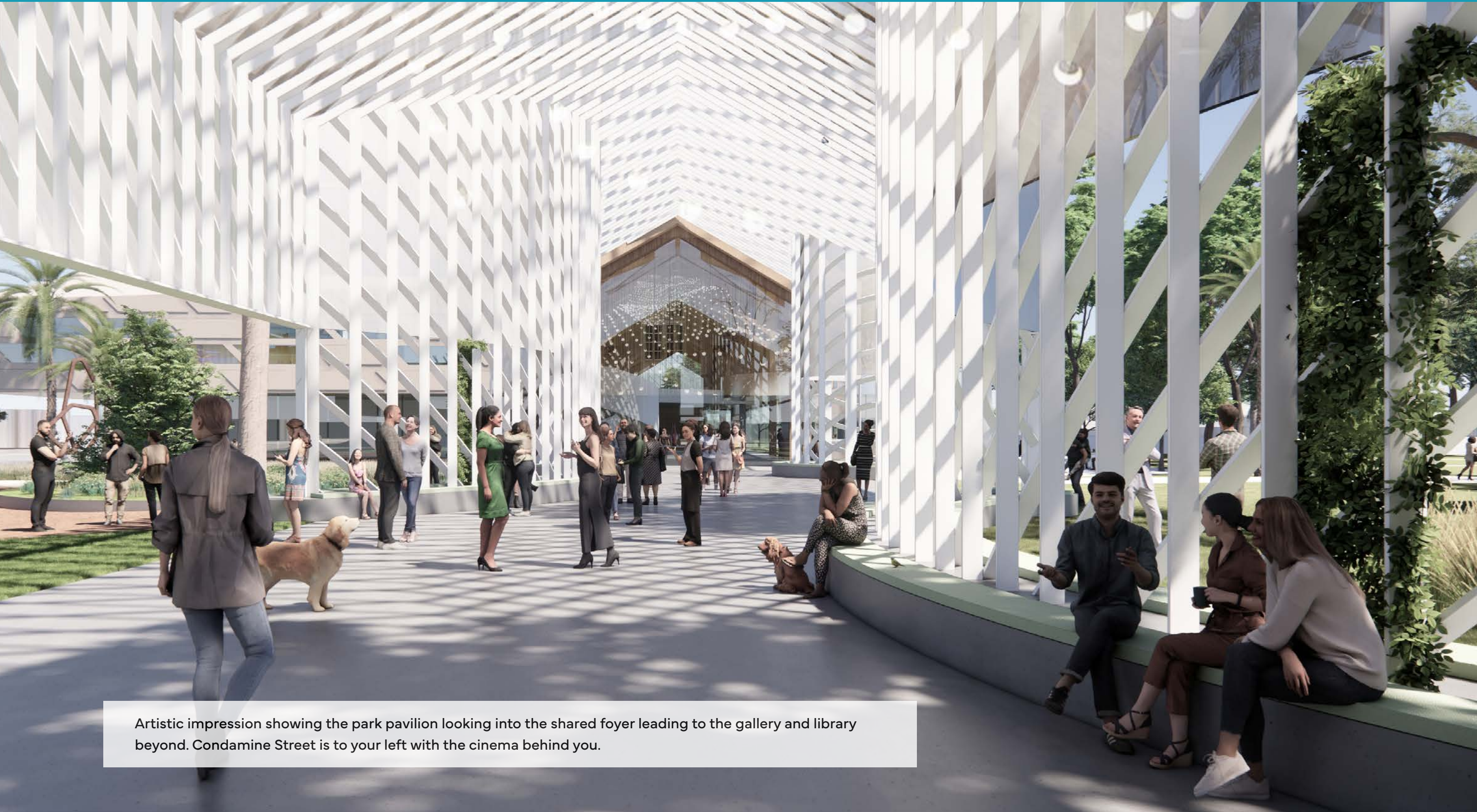
Catch a movie walking distance from the town centre, or screen your own creative projects in the multimedia space.

A SOCIAL HUB

Community have expressed a desire for a vibrant social hub where people can come together for events and activities in a space that feels welcoming and safe for everyone. This should include places for private functions and celebrations, community gatherings and large-scale public events that can run across the day and into the night. Socialising and events should be integrated with arts and culture to create a place where there is always something to do for everyone.

3a – Café

A café overlooking the park, connected to the cultural centre creates a focal point to gather whatever your reason for visiting the precinct.



3b – Library lounge

Flexible space for incidental interaction, meeting and refuge looking out into the park.



3c – Parkland gathering spaces

Large open lawns, intimate spaces between trees, formal and informal event spaces and improved cooking and dining facilities mean a variety of spaces to socialise in nature.



3d – Interconnected shared spaces

A range of spaces connecting building to park with formal and informal meeting places inside and out.

EMBEDDED IN NATURE

Community wanted the new cultural centre to be embedded in nature, creating more opportunities for everyone to spend more time outdoors and interacting with our beautiful Thomas Jack Park. The vision is for a place where people can study, learn, experience art and be entertained in proximity to nature and the benefits it offers to our wellbeing and mental health.

4a - Arts and nature intertwined

Art trails, outdoor art pieces and cultural storytelling through the park connect the arts with our environment.



4c - Nature play

An outdoor 'messy play area' at the Library plus nature play as shown through the mature trees provides more opportunities for our young children to connect with nature through play.



4d - Design responding to the natural environment

Architectural cut-outs to accommodate and feature existing mature trees plus extensive planting and new bio-retention to respect and enhance the park's existing natural beauty.



4b - Feel connected to the park

Glazed walls and expansive windows through the library, gallery and foyer so you feel connected to the green space whilst inside.

Custom artworks, bespoke play structures and thoughtful palette of materials, colours and native plants express and amplify Dalby's identity.

The beautiful tree canopy is brought to life with creative lighting to create an exciting evening welcome to the precinct



5b - Eastern arrival gateway

A building of scale and creative form setback from the road and surrounded by trees creates a sense of arrival and invites travellers to stop and explore.



5d - Reimagined Visitor Information Centre

A modern welcome point for visitors showcases Western Downs tourism highlights and connects to a multimedia room.

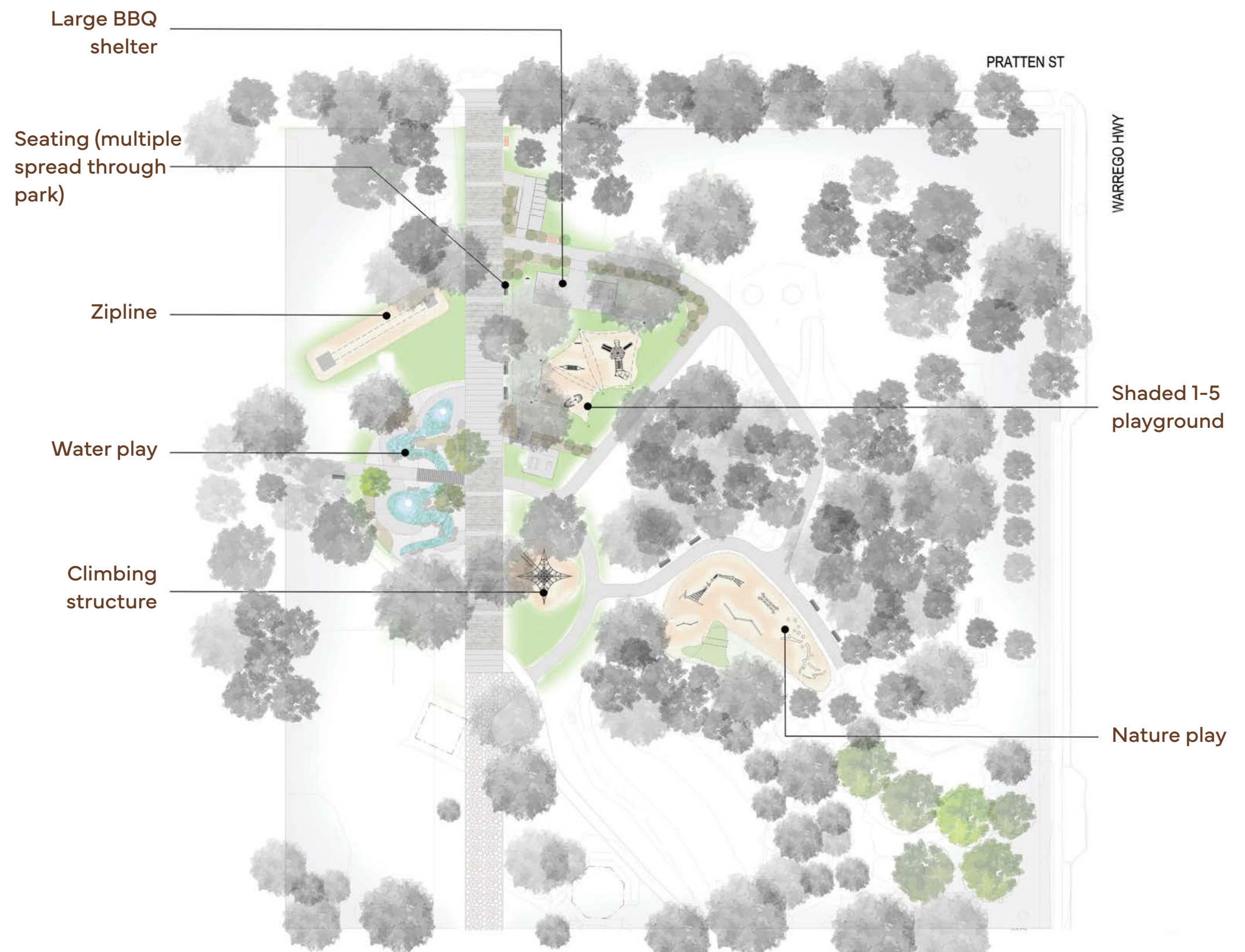

Park and Play - the Masterplan

The designers and landscape architects are working on a masterplan for the precinct; a long-term vision which will be used to guide future investment. Council are committed to delivering Stage 1 of the masterplan which includes the cultural centre buildings and some of the parkland and play.

The image opposite zooms in on the Bunya Street side of the park to show the play and landscaping aspects that are proposed to be included in Stage 1 development:

- Water play
- Zip line
- Nature play with agility trail amongst the mature trees
- Covered age 1-5 playground
- New barbecue facilities - 2 single barbecues in Stage 1
- New amenities
